A Rabbi's Word

Some years ago, whilst creating a new adult education programme for the shul I worked in, I was told 'Rabbi don't put in too much text study; it puts people off and it has no relevance to today anyway...' At the time, I wondered what had happened to the Rabbinic ideal of engaging in the study of Torah lishma (for its own sake), 'relevance' whatever that meant in the context, didn't really come in to it'.

Personally I was disappointed by comment because studying texts is one of my great passions. It sparked a memory of when I was at Grammar School and my Latin teacher bought in a text. It was one of the letters written by Pliny the Younger to his friend, the Roman historian Tacitus. It describes in fascinating and terrifying detail the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in August 79 BCE and the death of his uncle (Pliny the Elder) in Pompeii. Reading a 2000 year old eyewitness account of a catastrophe which there was SO much archeological evidence. was entirely riveting to us. Pliny's letters read as if they were written vesterday (albeit in ancient Latin). In the absence of easily available on-line cheating tools my class mates and I would go home eager translate copious amounts of Latin, simply to find what happened next. Was the text relevant to us? Perhaps not but it brought the past to life in a way that no other text had ever done before and that was exciting.



The same sense of historical revelation occurred when I discovered the secular Hebrew poetry of the Jewish poets of the Andalusian Golden Age. Their poems were clever, witty, daring and quite impudently outrageous and vet they were written by Jewish communal leaders: well-known Talmud scholars. who also happened to be Muslim Spain's noblemen: statesmen, military leaders, philosophers and poets. The apparent libertine attitudes the Muslims led to fruitful crossа fertilization of culture, thought, science and literature.

Are these poems still relevant to us today? They offer a fascinating glimpse into our past as entertaining, at times quite shocking, cultural expressions of a past few of us know anything about. We suddenly realise that there were other periods in history in which we were able to integrate into the wider society and that cultural integration did necessarily lead to total assimilation. Our ancient texts are voices from the past - they speak to us as clearly as the day that they were written. If only we want to listen, we will always find something relevant in them.

Mosaic Liberal has over the vears been blessed with numerous members who have voluntarily given much of their time for the benefit of others. whether servina Council or on committees, taking part in services. helping at bazaars or iumble sales at Preston Road. doina security, etc., etc. One of

our members who died in May gave unstintingly of her time for so many years in another way. Her passion was the Synagogue song and dance Group 326, named after the address of our Preston Road building. I refer of course to Sylvia Freedman.

Sylvia had a difficult childhood and upbringing in Stoke Newington; she lost her mother at birth, and the little girl was adopted by an aunt and uncle. There was a large extended family with maiden aunts. cousins and two stepsisters. But Sylvia was determined to do her own thing, started at a Solicitors' office, went to college to learn shorthand and typing, and stayed at the firm for nearly 30 years. She married Leslie Miller; they had two children. Ruth and Simon, were living in Harrow, and became involved with the Wembley & District Liberal Synagogue, as we were then known. Leslie became chairman of the Social Committee, and Sylvia was the shul's Hon Secretary for many years. She and Leslie were married for 24 years; she subsequently married David Freedman with whom



she spent a further 33 very happy years. All three remained friends.

But back to her main interest, Group 326. She organised, produced and acted in countless shows over the years, singing and choreographing old time musical favourites and Broadway show numbers. In this she was greatly assisted by David, and

together they succeeded in raising thousands of pounds for Synagogue funds and other charities, as well as giving great pleasure to the residents of numerous old age homes where they took their performances "on the road". The highlight was a performance in the mid-1980s at the Watford Palace Theatre. which was filled with members and friends Synagogue enjoying another evening of song and dance.

Sylvia was always very glamorous, and loved receiving compliments about her clothes and jewellery, often from total strangers. Her bungalow in Bushey housed her extensive collections of both, and her granddaughters have inherited her sense of fashion.

Sylvia was a very special person. We send our sincere condolences to Ruth, Simon and the whole family and wish them all long life, and also Harold, her companion in recent years.

BERAKAH - by Adrian Cohen



f music is the food of love then it can also be, amongst many other things the harbinger of peace, serenity and spirituality, to name just three. Art of all kinds can have a transformative quality that leads you to new ways of feeling or thinking about the world. ('blessing' in Hebrew and Arabic) is a musical collaboration of four core members who came together not just to create and play music but to explore their spirituality in all its forms. The core members are from the three Abrahamic traditions and together they have created something unique. They are each in their own right gifted musicians who, together, have created something that defies being pigeonholed.

Their influences are Middle Eastern. Blues. Jazz. Rock and Acoustic. Their musical range encompasses Yedid Nefesh as a violin solo to rock songs such as U2's Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For and beyond to a Blues/Soul/Gospel version of Curtis Mayfield's People Get Ready. Thev write beautiful original music and lyrics. Their recent concert was held in St 17th James's Church, Piccadilly, century architectural aem bv Sir

Christopher Wren, which is – if one strips out the altar etc – similar to a synagogue of that period with a ladies' gallery, exquisite.

I have had the privilege of seeing Berakah on five different occasions, not just listening to them but watching them They perform in create. the best traditions of jazz, with extemporised solos that give and take with a generosity of spirit that lies at the core of their music. I must tell you that their version of U2's Still Haven't Found What I'm Looking For not only expresses the restless spiritual journey that they are on but also our journey and the first time I heard it my immediate reaction was "Eat your heart out, U2".

Well, the good news folks is that Berakah, who have recently expanded to six musicians, guitar, piano, violin and singer as the essential four, are now featuring a cello and viola, are coming to 39 Bessborough Road to perform for us on Sunday 22nd November 2015. If you only do one thing this year, don't miss it. They are unforgettable and have a profound lasting effect.

HANDS ACROSS THE OCEAN

An Israeli Arab and founder of a centre which promotes coexistence, has flown to the UK for one day to give comfort to a terminally ill woman.

Mohammed Fahili, who runs the Sir Charles Clore Jewish-Arab community centre in Akko, Israel flew to the bedside of artist and author, Gilda Zeitlin in Harrow on Sunday (June 14).

Gilda and her husband Graham, both

members of Mosaic Reform, first met Mr Fahili many years ago after attending a number of talks, including one at the Dyson (of vacuum fame) family in Northwood and another at a reception at the House of Lords.

They were so impressed by his work they visited his centre in Israel about four years ago and formed a bond with this charismatic man.

Graham said: "The place was amazing, so inspiring. When I told him Gilda was

terminally ill he immediately said he would come to the UK to see her. came as a friend. They were alone together and I don't know exactly what he said to her but she was so delighted to see him. He said how much they appreciated her support. She said it was so wonderful that he came all this way to see her. He really helped her. "The fact that, as an Arab Muslim, he flew from Israel to London for one day to see a sick Jewish woman is significant. It is so heart-warming. He said his talented wife was:" holding her own. In spite of everything, she is such a positive, warm and cheerful person."

Graham said Mohammed and his family lived in Haifa in 1948 when he first became involved with Jews. He said: "He joined a kibbutz at the age of 14, where everyone was so kind to him and he got to love it. His father had died and he was given food for his family who were very poor. He always wanted to pay Jewish people back. "He travelled, at one stage working as a waiter in New York where the hotel owner asked him if he could teach his son who was nearing barmitzvah age, as Mohammed was fluent in Hebrew. "Eventually he went

back to Israel to open the centre which aims to bring people together, whatever their background."

Akko is a city with two-thirds Jews, and one third Arab. They lived side by side, but never really interacted until the Sir Charles Clore Jewish-Arab Community Center was built in 1990 and greatly improved integration and co-operation. It now provides high quality, low-cost services for poor people, irrespective of background. Its services range from women's clubs to summer camps.

Gilda, taught art at City Lit and for Camden Council, before branching out on her own. She then became a renowned textile artist and as Gilda Baron has written a book, The Art of Embroidered Flowers, translated into Norwegian and Russian and produced two DVDs on textiles.

The couple have been married for years. Gilda has three children and three grandchildren and Graham has two children and two grandchildren. Graham said they would be making a donation towards a new centre which is due to open in the future.

Pennine Walk

y retirement bucket list had always included a trip to take in Wainwright's coast-to-coast walk across the Pennines. I still haven't got round to it, but this month I did the next best thing and walked the Pennine Way in the Yorkshire National Park with a small party from the Jewish Country Walkers.

From our base camps in Settle and Hawes, and over four days, we walked from Gargrave to Malham (10 miles); to Horton (17 miles); to Hawes (10 miles); and to Keld (15 miles). If you have been to the Yorkshire Dales, you may be familiar with some of the sights that we encountered: the limestone features of Gordale Scar

and Janet's Fosse in Malham; the tall peak of Pen-Y-Ghent in Ribblesdale; Hardraw Force in Wensleydale (the highest single-leap waterfall in England) and the stunning views from Upper Swaledale.

We covered more than 50 miles; not a lot, you might say, but a challenge for me nonetheless.

it was Although a personal challenge, I would like to share it with you and use this opportunity to promote the Karen Morris Memorial Trust (a charity established in 1999 to provide facilities and support for leukaemia patients and their families (www.kmmt.org.uk).

Board of Deputies Report

Meeting at Board Offices of Defence Division 9th June

This was the first meeting with Marie Van de Zyl, the new Vice President (West London Synagogue).

A CST representative advised that terrorist taking arrests are place regularly in the UK (e.g. two in Berkshire, three in Walsall in the past week). At the last election the BNP only secured 1500 votes with candidates as against 300 candidates who secured nearly 500,000 votes in 2010. This shows the demise of BNP (presumably UKIP secured all the votes).

A global conference took place recently in Israel on Anti-Semitism with over 1000 Jews in attendance.

A demonstration in Golders Green is due to take place on July 4th. This is headed by the outfit "Dawn", an 'old style' National Front. About 50 people are expected but also some from the far right from Poland. However 1000+ expected are as а counter demonstration, mainly by the Campaign Against Anti-Semitism. The CST will be providing reassurance patrols. The Board is also planning to be present in large numbers and to stand under the banner of combating racism. This demonstration is likely to bring the Community together. demonstration is presently allowed by the police as it is a static demonstration

(not a march). Under the Public Order Act the police determine the date, numbers and place for the demonstration. They are likely to be there in sufficient numbers to prevent violence taking place.

The Chair of the Jewish Union of Students advised there are 17 UK campuses where there is an Israeli BDS Policy of which only 7 are tied to the BDS movement. The recent vote by the University Students' Union to operate a BDS policy against Israel was by 19 votes to 14. However this is not binding on the universities themselves and Jewish students the aoina to Universities need not be overly concerned.

We should be aware that in considering the problems of Shechita and circumcision, practices by the Muslim Community on similar issues are quite different to those practised by the Jewish community and in discussions with Government ministers we should not all be tarred with the same brush.

Following the French supermarket tragedy the SNP has taken a far greater interest in the Jewish Community in Scotland, to the extent that they are involving themselves in coming to synagogue services and being prepared to talk at open meetings with the Jewish community there.

The Mosaic community were treated to an enjoyable, entertaining and informative Sunday afternoon of anecdotes, with


musical interludes on the life and work of the unique harmonica performer and raconteur Larry Adler.
