Rabbi Lionel Blue

6th February 1930 - 19th December 2016

First Minister of Middlesex New Synagogue 1961 – 1964

Some personal memories

met Lionel for the first time as a student of the newly created Leo Baeck College at West London Synagogue and our cordial relationship was immediately established. He introduced me to the East End, especially Whitechapel and the history of Eastern European Jewry. So when the opportunity occurred that he was available to MNS as a recently ordained student in 1961, we were all delighted. We had been a very fast growing community and the need for a spiritual leader was essential. What a scoop for MNS!

Lionel first started with us when we held services at the Congregational Church at Preston Road and quite a substantial cheder at a private school in Wembley, before moving into our present premises in Harrow. He was inspirational, eccentric and loveable and taught us to challenge our beliefs, ask questions and then to work them out for ourselves. As a sermoniser, he was unique, always talking without notes and never sending his congregation to sleep. I remember his last High Holiday service with us when he proudly presented me with a script which he immediately destroyed and then gave a memorable address by analysing line by line Pete Seeger's song of

'Where Have All the Flowers Gone?' which all the old congregants will never forget.

He was a wonderful story teller, as my children still remember, as he introduced them to Christopher Robin as bedtime stories. He also introduced the community to other religions including a visit to a Mosque in Brighton.

All the students in the College regularly came to our Shabbat services. Lionel's outlook on festivals was quite controversial, e.g. Purim was a sombre occasion with a large slice related to Jewish persecutions and the Holocaust. He had a wonderful relationship with the cheder, never talking down to either teachers or the kids but treating them as equals.

With great regret, Lionel left us in 1964 to pursue his interest in European Jewry and helping to revitalise it after the Second World War. However, he retained fond links with MNS, receiving our magazine monthly and visiting us on various memorable occasions, including our 50th anniversary.

The last time I saw Lionel was at the MRJ conference at Nottingham in 2014 where he again had us all sitting at his feet.

Rest in peace, Lionel, and I am sure you are listening to Marlene Dietrich's records and writing more books. Shalom.

Lionel Blue at Jewish Book Week (2007)

rom 3rd to 13th March (2007), Jewish Book week was held at the Royal National hotel near Russell Square. Many top Jewish personalities spoke or

acted-out delightful Jewish literary works during the event.

Gill and I went to two of the sessions, including readings by Henry Goodman and Andrew Sachs. We particularly enjoyed listening to Rabbi Lionel Blue being

interviewed by Clive Lawton on Lionel's most recent book and autobiography.

I was personally taught at cheder by Lionel Blue in the 50s, when he and Michael Leigh were student rabbis at Leo Baeck College, and when Rabbi Van de Zyl was the rabbi at North Western Reform Synagogue at Alyth Gardens.

Lionel read from his book about his times as a young student travelling through Europe, meeting-up with people of many faiths. He spoke of his time as a broadcaster, his recipes and, in particular, many tales about his mother of whom he speaks very kindly. He also spoke quite openly of his homosexuality and discovering his tendency while on a date at Oxford University with a nice young lady. All his stories have a 'chaimisher' feel about them.

I mentioned my own times with him at cheder and, as the first rabbi at Middlesex New, I asked him for a suitable story. He came out with the old chestnut that, when he was burying a member of the community, he fell into the grave and had to be physically lifted out. In order to be resuscitated, he was provided with a wee dram of whisky.

Holocaust Memorial Education Day at Mosaic

year ago, a few members of our community took part in the Northwood Holocaust Memorial Education Day programme. These events have been run extremely successfully for over a decade, growing year-on-year and now inviting over 3000 youngsters. Additional communities have been brought in, including Bushey United, Belmont and Watford synagogues. This year, we at Mosaic decided to reach out to new areas and to run sessions.

We were quite ambitious to begin with, thinking we would do four sessions. But it didn't quite materialise that way. Instead, we will have one session on Wednesday 8th February when three schools will attend with nearly 70 young people aged 14-15. We will run the event along the lines

very clearly outlined by Northwood. The format includes a short film and small facilitated workshops, where the young people get to participate and think about aspects of the Holocaust.

After refreshments, they will hear a holocaust survivor relate their personal story. This year we are fortunate to have Helen Aronson from Pinner as our guest speaker. The afternoon will conclude with the lighting of a memorial candle, followed by a one minute silence for reflection on the immensity of the Holocaust and other genocides and the lessons pertinent to the students' own lives.

We have had an extremely good response for volunteers from the three Mosaic communities. Hopefully, next year the word will spread and we will have more students attending. Following this inaugural Holocaust Memorial Education Day event at Mosaic, there will be a full written report in the next issue of Kehila.

And it was good, and all who saw or heard of it knew it to be good. In fact, good for these people who in the moment at least, felt valued and respected in a land where so many demonise their very presence.

Pringles and a Prayer

A tale of Inequality

few weeks ago a friend's mother died and I was asked to go to the shiva. I told one of our mutual friends – an Indian Catholic lady – about the shiva and she promised to attend on the second night.

As my bereaved friend was a member of the United Synagogue, this would be my first orthodox shiva for many years. So I got out my Pringles kippah (pictured) which my daughter had bought me on her school trip to Israel. I had worn it to a bat Mitzvah a few years back and was told by members of what was then Harrow and Wembley Progressive Synagogue (now Mosaic Liberal) that they thought I must be orthodox because of the kippah. So I knew

I would fit in at the orthodox shiva!

I got to the shiva shortly before prayers were starting and, other than the female mourners, all the women were sitting in the kitchen and the men were sitting in the front room ready for prayers. Whether or not this was by request, or just expectation, I thought that it was sad that in this important life cycle event members of the same family were being separated.

After much thought, I called my Indian Catholic lady friend. I explained that I didn't think the prayers would be a good experience for her because, rather than supporting a friend in his time of need, she would probably be exiled to the kitchen.

We decided together that probably the best thing for her would be to turn up about 20 minutes after the prayers started, so that she could be there to comfort the bereaved friend but would not have the indignity of being exiled to the kitchen.

It made me reflect on the values that we as liberal and progressive Jews hold dear – equality between men and women, particularly when it really matters at important lifecycle events such as bar and bat mitzvahs and the sad passing of members of our families. It confirmed for me my decision to be a member of a Liberal synagogue.



rudi Leibling reports: Forty people attended the JACS meeting in early December to hear Rabbi Middleton talk about her journey to become a rabbi.

Although we have a woman, the Queen, as head of the Commonwealth and a female prime minister, Kathleen had to fight a battle to wear a tallit. Her wish to become a rabbi started with her love of singing as a young girl and feeling in her element singing in the Synagogue. She studied at several schools before being ordained at the Leo Baeck college and constantly had to stand up for her belief in equality and desire to be recognised as a rabbi alongside male colleagues. Interestingly she has found that it is often congregants, rather than other rabbis, who have found it difficult to accept a female rabbi. Times have changed and today, when Kathleen's son was asked what he wanted to do when he was older, he said he could not become a rabbi because he was a man!

As Trudi says 'we left the meeting very enlightened by all the stories and happy to know that Rabbi Kathleen had reached Mosaic Reform with her delightful family to be our female rabbi.'
