Counting the Days

n the reading room of my old University's Library hung a beautiful 19th century Omer Calendar, It was a parchment Scroll with each day of the Omer beautifully illuminated, mounted in a little, wooden box with a glass front and two wooden poles on either side that allowed one to scroll from one day to the next. The calendar was permanently set on a particular day as it was never used for its intended purpose.

I spent much time in that reading room, and often I felt tempted to turn one of the handles, to discover the various illuminations of the other days. I often thought of the Omer calendar, when I realised I had forgotten to count. If only we had a calendar like that in the synagogue, we would not have to struggle with the perennial problem of remembering what day of the Omer it is today. Nowadays there are phone apps that do just that, and in my own home, we have established a little ritual of ticking a little box next to each day of the Omer on a paper calendar in our kitchen. Because my children enjoy ticking the box each day, we are quite good at remembering to count the Omer.

But why count at all? The Omer is a remnant of an ancient practice which has

its roots in the ancient Temple service, in which the grain harvest was celebrated with a special ritual. A measure of barley was reaped, and waved at the altar by the officiating priest on the first day of Pesach; this ritual was repeated all through the harvest period beginning with the barley harvest and ending with the wheat harvest seven weeks later on Shavuot.

The Omer period links the two Festivals of Pesach and Shavuot, in a reminder that no liberation is complete unless it leads to awareness and responsibility. The counting is an exercise of increased awareness of our own role in the world in the eradication from oppression. We are not just counting the days which we know from experience, is quite difficult to do, but we are actually challenged to make every day count: To be fully aware of the world around us, and our role in it, to make every day stand out amongst others - even in the smallest measure; a simple gesture of kindness, the appreciation of a beautiful day. Counting the days is the first step of a life of mindfulness; and a concerted effort to make each day beautiful, like each illuminated number in the Omer calendar in the reading room of my University's library.

ON A SERIOUS NOTE

Interfaith Pre-Seder

here was an interfaith 'pre-Seder' at the Wembley Central Mosque on Sunday afternoon, 2nd April, eight days before Pesach started. The event was organised by Rabbi Frank together with Sohail Ahmed and it was well attended by Jews, Muslims and Christians.

The theme was about what we share in common concerning the ethic of renewing freedom, justice, empathy and kindness as a preparation for Passover, Easter and Ramadan. Three keynote speakers – representing Judaism, Christianity and Islam – gave their perspectives of how collaboration can help towards resolving the challenges that we face.

Rabbi Frank reviewed the Exodus story: how it started with Pharaoh's growing oppression of the Israelites, who were economic refugees, and his decree to kill all male new-born babies. The local midwives - we don't know if they were Hebrews or Egyptians - defied Pharaoh and refused to kill any Hebrew baby boys. This suggests that we can work together to save lives. With regard to the oppressors, it was fear and anxiety that led people to abuse others. At the end of Exodus, God manages to forgive the traumatized Israelites who struggle to understand what it is to become free let alone what it is to assume the necessary ethical, emotional and spiritual challenges. Yet, by the end of the Book of Exodus the ex-slaves move forward with a bit more harmony. This unvarnished story

gives us hope despite the gritty realities of group behaviour.

Reverend Leão Neto gave a Methodist-Christian perspective. He explained his rationale for Lent in preparation for Easter which shares the suffering of the world and of Christ. He acknowledged the imperfections we live with. Hope can be found through fasting, or giving up something, as this serves to turn our minds back in repentance and renew us to love life and work for freedom.

With respect to Islam, Aisha Kahn spoke of freedom from slavery and the freedom to practise one's religion. She recounted that at the recent funeral of anti-apartheid activist Ahmed Kathrada in South Africa, there was no dominant race or religion, showing how times have changed. As a message of hope for freedom she also recounted how Prophet Mohammed formulated a covenant between tribes, including Jews, so people could live and work together in harmony.

We then had two speakers from EcoPeace-Middle East. Gidon Bromberg, the Israeli Director, described the suffering of two-million people in Gaza, a 10km stretch of land where the only source of drinking water is a depleted underground aquifer. Salt water flows into the aquifer from the Mediterranean and there is no sewage system, so pollution further contaminates the ground water. This polluted water causes many gastronomic diseases and cancer and it is only a matter of time before there

will be a cholera epidemic. The Israeli and Palestinian authorities mostly continue to blame each other for the problem. However, EcoPeace encourages working together and taking responsibility for the provision of clean water and there is some progress with a further ten million cubic metres of desalinated water being provided by the Israelis. However, animosity still acts as a barrier to people working together in shared self-interest; pollutants and epidemics don't respect borders.

Jordan Director Mungeth Mehyar spoke about the Jordan River, with the five bordering countries all struggling with limited water resources. Some 98% of the water is diverted and the river is highly polluted. We again witness a blame culture. But Jordanian. Palestinian and Israeli EcoPeace representatives have studied the river together and have spoken to the different governments in an attempt to provide water security for everyone. This has been partially successful as 9 million cubic metres have been recovered so more water can be provided to the many Syrian refugees in Jordan. Mungeth, ever the optimist, hopes for further peace treaties

one day so this collaboration could be extended to Syria and Lebanon. EcoPeace continues to work for cooperation to make change for the good of all.

In response, the Mayor of Brent endorsed the need for peace to help resolve the problem. He promised to work with Eco Peace in their efforts, even after he leaves office in May.

Rabbi Frank further described the sessions held at the Mosque to train police officers to cope with the concerns of Jews and Muslims, especially with respect to increasing hate crime. He also mentioned a planned art project to paste different styles of texts on parchment to create a large scroll as a multi-faith message of hope.

The final speaker was Salman Butt, a Muslim scholar. He stated that he does not like to use the static word 'religion' but looks at faith as reflecting a positive existential power transaction to acknowledge and share what we all receive from God. He also recounted how the Prophet Mohammed advocated not wasting water and that we all have a moral responsibility for providing adequate water resources to everyone.

We were left feeling renewed hope and

strength as we tucked into the generous helpings of savoury and sweet 'light bites'. It was uplifting to be involved with three communities united intellectually, spiritually and socially. This does go some way to move forward in our troubled and 'not so free' world.



RIPAC Conference in Washington DC. There had been 18,000 delegates there. Nikki Haley, the US ambassador to the United Nations gave the outstanding speech of the conference. The vast majority of Jews that support the conference are orthodox but the ultra-right do not participate as they do not support a two-state solution (between Israel and the Palestinian Territories).

We then discussed bias of UNHRC against Israel. The UK have stated they will veto all anti-Israel motions while this bias continues. The BoD international division will put forward a motion to the next plenary that commends our Government's stance on this.

A discussion then ensued on whether there will be a reduction in religious freedom inside Europe.

Ken Livingstone - Why the Labour Party have got it all wrong?

It is no surprise, despite Ken Livingstone being found guilty of bringing the Labour Party into disrepute and of making 'theoretically' anti-Semitic remarks, that he was given a slap on the wrists and a two-year suspended sentence.

Until the Labour Party accepts the definition of Anti-Semitism as that provided by the EU and accepted by the Conservative Party: that it is in the eyes of the recipient (i.e. the Jew) whether a remark has caused offence and not of the prospective offender, then it is irrelevant who they put in charge of any committee. They appointed Shami Chakrabarti to produce the enquiry on Anti-Semitism inside the Labour Party. But instances of Anti-Semitic remarks by many inside the Labour Party were ignored because those making the remarks do not consider they are making Anti-Semitic remarks even if they are highly offensive.

This is specifically the problem of Livingstone. He has gone out of his way to make offensive remarks for as many years as I can remember (in this last case in relation to Hitler and Zionism). It is in my view irrelevant whether his remarks have any historical fact (the case with Hitler is totally taken out of context). It is the fact that he feels the need to be so offensive that defines him as an Anti-Semite.

Corbyn seems to have accepted that the two-year suspended sentence for Livingstone is acceptable. He did not ensure that the three persons who were judging him advise that he be removed from the Labour Party if found guilty. The fact that Corbyn has suggested that he should be retried for further remarks that he has since made beggars belief.
